



It was an exciting and encouraging week for TCPS spring athletics as our student-athletes continued to compete with passion and make great strides across the board.

Middle School Girls Volleyball

The Lady Hawks had a full week, playing three matches and showing tremendous growth and fight. The team earned a big win over Belvoir and battled hard in a match with Grace, a close, hard-fought loss in one of the most competitive matches of the season. They also faced again with St. Jude, a rematch from the previous week, falling just short in the second set of the contest.

Coach Georgia McPherson praised her team's progress, saying: "This team has shown remarkable improvement as the season progresses. At the start of the year, many were still adjusting to the pace of competitive play. Through consistent practice and dedication, they've improved immensely.
