However, in 1880, Oliver Wendell Holmes, years before serving on the U.S. Supreme Court, simplified the motto to a single word: Veritas, or "Truth." The symbolic and philosophical implication of that change suggests that truth can exist apart from Christ, "Truth without Christ." As believers, we know that to be both impossible and empty, for without Christ, there is no Veritas, no truth at all.


