Growing up as a young boy, my mother's table preparation for a meal was thoughtful and decorative. It was more than a meal; it was an event. I remember listening to the deep cadence of Tom Brokaw in the background as he provided essential conversation pieces through the nightly news. My great aunt Clara delicately and routinely prepared Sunday lunches with generous invitations as long as you attended church. During Sunday lunch, I could expect the heartfelt question, "Now Jared, how are you doing?" These three memories and many unmentioned are strong examples of connection with family and friends that revolve around a dinner table. Call me old fashioned, but eating together is tremendously vital to the well-being of a family and a community.

The people who know me best can support the idea that I have a propensity for the antiquated, past traditions, and just old stuff. A quick search online will find that I am not on social media because I prefer meaningful interaction that goes beyond a character limit or clicking a like. A shared meal provides the space and time for meaningful interaction. On Easter, I spent time reflecting on when Christ was most vulnerable, the last time he shared a meal with his disciples. The shared meal provided an opportunity for Christ to explain the next and biggest step, his death and resurrection, while also being the example of the great commission to his disciples.

I grew up sitting around a table listening to stories from my family and the most important people to me. The stories, debates, and conversations engrained a need for engagement.

Considering the busy lives we all live, I pray that students today can hear stories, debates, and learn what questions to ask in a heartfelt and genuine manner like, "Now Jared, how are you doing?" and have the awareness to love each other while sitting around a table eating.

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
























MIDDLE SCHOOL VOLLEYBALL
