MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Any plans for this weekly message changed yesterday afternoon with word of the tragedy that fell on our partners and friends in Nashville, TN. I believe that I can speak for our community in saying that our hearts, thoughts, and prayers are with the families of Covenant Presbyterian School. Like Covenant School, Tennessee Christian is part of a larger conglomeration of private schools delivering a unique mission dedicated to the foundational belief that Christ should be in education. Together as private Christian schools across the country, we grieve due to the antithesis of these schools' missions. The events of the past twenty-four hours requires reflection and action. First, as a school administration, we are actively reviewing our school emergency plans and our ALICE training received in the fall of 2022. Second, we need to cover all Christian educational institutions with prayer. The department of education lists close to five million students and half a million teachers engaged in private education. We need to pray for all of these institutions. I was touched to learn that this morning, a grandparent came on campus and prayed from her vehicle over our students, faculty, and staff. I would ask that the families in our community join together in daily prayer for the safety of our school and for schools engaged in meaningful and missional Christian education. I recall part of St. Patrick's Breastplate as a prayer for all of us.



CHICKAMAUGA BATTLEFIELD

Battlefield. As part of American History Research, the class spent the day walking through the timeline of September 18-20, 1863, one of the most violent battles of the Civil War. The first emotional response from the students as we arrived on campus was how beautiful the grounds and monuments were honoring the soldiers who fought in the battle. Our students showed great respect as we toured the site of the first conflict to the final atop Horseshoe Ridge. While touring a pivotal location that saw brutal fighting, Isaiah Munoz saw

revealed a horseshoe. As a class, we are now working with a restoration historian to determine the age of the horseshoe. It was great to see the students' interest in archaeology.
