This time, I was thrilled to discover they had a new exhibit: The Megiddo Mosaic.

As soon as we entered the exhibit, my inner history nerdiness took charge. I learned that the Megiddo Mosaic dates back to the 3rd century AD, nearly a century before Constantine issued the Edict of Milan, which allowed Christianity to be practiced openly within the Roman Empire. Remarkably, this mosaic was part of a Christian place of worship during one of the most intense periods of persecution. Even more fascinating was the fact that it was funded by a Roman centurion, a military figure who risked his career and life for the faith. This all points to the mosaic being one of the earliest recorded Christian worship sites. The Megiddo discovery in 2024 and my viewing of this remarkable artifact allowed for me to reflect on the importance of history and Christianity.

The significance of history and its connection to Christianity is incredibly relevant to our modern world. Understanding the struggles and sacrifices of early Christians helps us appreciate the freedoms we enjoy today. It reminds us of the resilience of faith. We might never understand all about the people who stood on the Megiddo Mosaic and worshiped but we do understand their faith was directed to the Father and their prayers were heard as are ours.




There is nothing quite like learning outside of the classroom! On Tuesday, October 1, Mrs. McKee's fourth grade enjoyed a gorgeous fall day traveling to Red Clay State Historic Park. An interesting film gave us information on the important people of that time, including President Andrew Jackson, John Ridge, and Chief John Ross. We learned how the Cherokees met at Red Clay for their council meetings before they were forced to walk westward to Oklahoma on the Trail of Tears. In the museum, students met Rebecca Ketcher, a young Cherokee girl who walked the Trail of Tears as a child. This was an interactive AI experience where our students got to "interview" Rebecca as a 9-year old! In the center of the park stands the Eternal Flame, a memorial to all those who lost their lives, which was about 4,000.

Our tour guide, Ranger Taylor, kept our students engaged from beginning to end, sharing interesting historical facts, as well as the biology of plants (lots of mushrooms), bug life, and why the "Blue Hole" is blue! The end of our tour included a weapons demonstration, which is always a highlight of the trip. Parents, as well as students, got a chance to practice their aim with a blow gun! We finished with a picnic lunch at the pavilion. Our students represented TCPS extremely well with their behavior and excellent questions.

## **Red Clay** State Historic Park





On Tuesday, October 1, the fifth-grade students took their first field trip of the year to Ruby Falls. The trip began with an elevator ride down to the entrance of the cave. Following a tour guide, the fifth graders received both a history lesson and a science lesson! They learned about the history of the cave, how it was discovered and who discovered it, as well as how Ruby Falls got its name. Various rock formations, including stalactites and stalagmites, were pointed out along the way. Students were able to ask questions such as "Why is it wet inside a cave?" and "Where does the water come from?"

Once deep inside the cave, the students were excited to see the waterfall! They learned that Ruby Falls is the largest interior waterfall in the United States.

The next day the students enjoyed reflecting on the field trip. Not only did they have a valuable educational experience, but they also have a shared memory as a fifth-grade class that they won't soon forget.
