
from the **Head**

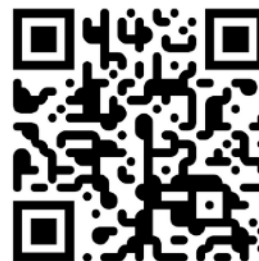
