We found several interesting things!

- Mussels filter feeders that "eat" the toxins in the water
- Larvae of mayflies and dragonflies they have incomplete metamorphosis
- Water Strider he uses surface tension to move on top of the water
- Snail Darter fish which was on the Endangered Species list until Oct. 2022
- Water Snake which playfully swam around us for a few minutes - We learned they are not venomous!

The students enjoyed learning about the animals, but also playing at the water's edge in the sand/dirt bank, walking across the water on a suspension bridge, having a picnic lunch together, and watching up-close as a train with 137 cars (Thanks, Martin) zoomed past! A successful day, to say the least.

Mario Bros. movie (and more snacks) in a virtually empty theater. "All the Things" did not disappoint - everyone left with full bellies and even fuller hearts!




7TH GRADE, HUNTSVILLE SPACE MUSUEM FIELD TRIP

I hope to take every piece of my unique background and put it to work serving your students. I am honored for the opportunity to do so. FINE ARTS DEPARTMENT PRESENTS


