Every year, I have the opportunity to write a grant through the Arts in Education Program with the Cleveland Bradley Chamber of Commerce Allied Arts Council. In 2023, the grant allowed us to have our very own, Tara McSherry Bear, to showcase her beautiful hand embroidery work and the students fell in love with it! Since our students developed such an interest in Embroidery, I wrote this year's grant for Embroidery as well. This year, I was awarded the grant and we had quilter and mixed media artist, Jackie Cory, join us with over 30 years of experience as an artist and teacher. She developed individualized lessons for each of the grades where they have made things such as plants, birds, and hearts. Our Lower School students have learned basic stitches like the straight and back stitch and how to sew on a button while our Upper School Students have been learning the Stem Stitch, Bundle, Daisy Chain, French Knot, and so many more!

Our Lower School students have all come in for a one hour lesson to begin their projects and will finish them throughout the rest of this

school year and our Middle and Upper School students have had the pleasure of a directed study with Jackie for the last 2 weeks making a detailed embroidery project. It has been a joy to watch how passionate the students have become about embroidery and how proud they all are of their finished products! All projects will be on display at our Fine Arts Festival this year on April 26th.


LOWER SCHOOL CHEER
